2	DR. SOLOMON: President of the U.S.
3	Institute of Peace, one of four organizations
4	facilitating this Iraq Study Group that you'll be
5	hearing. I want to thank Senator Warner for making
6	this room available to us and for his support
7	this enterprise. You'll be hearing in a moment
8	from a number of Senators and Representatives of
9	the House and then from James A. Baker and Lee
10	Hamilton who are co-chairing the Iraq Study Group.
11	So Senator Warner, please.
12	SENATOR WARNER: Very briefly, I thank
13	all who attended here this morning. There is no
14	issue more confronting of our nation and the
15	coalition of nations working with us then to try
16	and bring back measures of stability and peace in
17	this troubled region of the world of Iraq. We are
18	fortunate that each of these individuals in the
19	room has stepped forward because each of them in
20	their period of public service have faced various
21	situations and bring forth to mind some experience.
22	To bear on this today is essential for this country
23	and the people.
24	SENATOR BIDEN: I'm here to thank
25	Chairman Warner for allowing me in this room. We
26	don't (Laughter.) as members of the Foreign

1	Relations Committee we don't Folks, I think this
2	is a very, very important enterprise that has begun
3	in this room. We have some of the most respected
4	people in the United States who have vast
5	experience in foreign policy, Former Secretary and
6	Former Chairman of the House and, folks, we have
7	an enduring interest in the Middle East and we have
8	a clear and in Iraq. And it may very well be
9	that over the next three months to six or seven
10	months that we may be in a difficult season hold
11	together this and hold together the country the
12	coherent plan as to how we could pursue it.
13	No one knows what's going to happen on
14	the ground for certain and who knows what we're
15	going to be faced with, except one thing is certain
16	that our interests are real and it may very well be
17	as I said earlier that this study group is required
18	not only to look at the situation as it exists now
19	but look at potential alternatives based on a Plan
20	B and Plan C depending on what happens and I
21	think if that occurs, we're going to need some
22	respected force outside of the Congress and outside
23	of the Administration to hold our interests
24	together.
25	So I'm happy to play a very, very small
26	part in this This is not a Congressional

1	commission. It's not an Administration study
2	group. It's an independent study group and as was
3	explained to us, many of us here, all the
4	Congressmen and Senators who are here are going to
5	be called upon to give our input as to how we see
6	things and what we have learned or observed So I
7	am thankful to the Secretary and thankful to the
8	Representative Hamilton for putting together such a
9	significant group, outside group, to take a fresh
10	look at how we proceed in Iraq because we're going
11	to be proceeding for some time one way or another.
12	It's my honor now to introduce Congressman Wolf to
13	give a few words.
14	REPRESENTATIVE WOLF: Thank you,
15	Senator. Let me thank Senator Warner for the room.
16	I appreciate the opportunity and all the members of
17	the House who stand in support of this effort. The
18	of fresh eyes on the target that men and women
19	of character and honesty and integrity and
20	confidence who love their country more than they
21	love their political party to take a look and so I
22	
	want to thank Secretary Baker for agreeing to do
23	want to thank Secretary Baker for agreeing to do this and Congressman Hamilton and also Bob Gates
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This is important for the country. The

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1	country is divided but as Senator Warner said and
2	Senator Biden, a group of men and women of
3	integrity and character came together to take a
4	fresh eye, a fresh approach. So I want to again
5	thank the institutes, the U.S. Institute of Peace,
6	CSIS, Center for the Study of the Presidency, and
7	the Baker Institute for also pulling together and
8	working on this. With that, I'll turn it over to
9	Secretary Baker.
10	SECRETARY BAKER: Thank you,
11	Congressman. Ladies and gentlemen, thank you all
12	for attending this press conference. We are
13	delighted to be here. We are here at the urging of
14	members of Congress as you have heard. You have a
15	handout before you that gives a lot of the details
16	regarding our group.
17	Let me simply say that our purpose is
18	to undertake a bipartisan, forward-looking
19	assessment of the current and prospective situation
20	on the ground in Iraq, its impact on the
21	surrounding region and its consequences for United
22	States' interests. One of the earlier speakers
23	made the point that this is something we do for our
24	nation, our objective. I know Chairman Hamilton
25	and I have the same objective in this regard, that
26	is to make an honest assessment of where we are and

1	now we go forward and take this issue to the extent
2	that we can out of politics.
3	We may indeed have an important
4	opportunity here to help resolve some difficult
5	questions through bipartisan collaboration, but I
6	want to underscore that we are under no illusions
7	whatsoever about the difficulty of this task. It
8	is going to be difficult. I'm hopeful that we have
9	assembled the talent and expertise that can provide
10	some useful insights and advice for the
11	Administration and the Congress about where we go
12	from here.
13	I will outline for you very briefly the
14	names of the members of our study group. We are
15	equally balanced in Republicans and Democrats. I
16	am Co-Chairman on the Republican side. Lee
17	Hamilton is Co-Chairman on the Democrat side. It's
18	a real pleasure, I might add, for me to have the
19	opportunity to work once again with Lee Hamilton.
20	When I was in government and he was in
21	government, we worked very closely together even
22	though we came from opposite sides of aisle. We
23	have recently worked very closely together as well
24	in the Commission on Federal Election Reform which
25	I co-chaired with President Jimmy Carter.
26	Frank Wolf indicated to you that we are

1	being assisted in our effort by some very fine
2	think tanks and policy institutes. An additional
3	one that I need to mention is CSIS under the
4	leadership of John Hamre. We have here Dick
5	Solomon who heads the Institute of Peace. You
6	heard from Dick earlier. Edward Djerejian who is
7	the Founding Director of the Baker Institute for
8	Public Policy at Rice University in Houston and
9	David Abshire who is President of the Center for
10	the Study of Presidency.
11	The Republican members of this study
12	group, in addition to myself, are Bob Gates who is
13	here with us today. Bob was former Director of
14	Central Intelligence under President George H. W.
15	Bush; Rudy Giuliani, whom you all know, a former
16	Mayor of New York and Associate Attorney General in
17	the Reagan Administration; Alan Simpson, former
18	Senator from Wyoming; and one other Republican
19	whose name we cannot release but will be released
20	shortly who has agreed to serve, one very
21	distinguished former Republican official.
22	The Democratic members that Lee will be
23	Chairman of are Leon Panetta who was, of course,
24	Chief of Staff for President Bill Clinton and then
25	served as an OMB Director; Vernon Jordan, a member
26	of the Transition Team for the Clinton/Gore

1	Administration and currently Senior Managing
2	Director with the Investment Banking Firm of Lazar
3	and Frere; Bill Perry who was Secretary of Defense
4	under President Clinton and Chuck Robb, former U.S.
5	Senator from Virginia who is also with us here
6	today.
7	Our efforts as I indicated earlier will
8	be supported by the four think tanks and we have a
9	number of expert working groups in various areas
10	which I think my Co-Chairman Lee Hamilton will
11	speak to you a little bit about and will also have
12	a few other observations. Lee.
13	REPRESENTATIVE HAMILTON: Good morning
14	to all of you. Thank you, Secretary Baker. First,
15	let me just say what a privilege it is to work with
16	Jim Baker. By any measure, he's one of the
17	outstanding public servants of this generation and
18	it's a high privilege for me to be with him and to
19	work with him. I cannot think of a better person
20	to work with and to lead this group.
21	Like Jim, I want to thank the four
22	think tanks that are involved here. Dick Solomon,
23	John Hamre, Edward Djerejian and David Abshire have
24	already done a tremendous amount of work up to this
25	point that Jim and I very, very much appreciate.
26	We are, of course, especially appreciative of the

1	support of these members of the United States
2	Senate and the United States House of
3	Representatives. Without their initiative, with
4	their support, this simply would not be possible.
5	We're very grateful to each one of them.
6	We've been in touch with a large number
7	of members, 30 or more, and the significant point
8	to make about that is that not a single one of them
9	has indicated that they are opposed to this
10	project. They all indicate quite to the contrary
11	that they are very supportive of it and Jim and I
12	are especially appreciative of those members who
13	come here this morning with a very, very heavy
14	schedule on Wednesday as is usually the case on the
15	Hill to be with us.
16	We do not presuppose Congressional
17	support of our recommendations. What these
18	gentlemen are doing today is to support the
19	process, to let them know of the need for this kind
20	of a group if they see that it might be helpful to
21	the work that they're engaged in and we welcome, of
22	course, that support.
23	Now let me share a few thoughts with
24	you about how we will proceed in the Iraq Study
25	Group. As Jim has said, we're going to take as
26	best we can a fresh bipartisan look at the

1	situation in Iraq which has to be the great
2	national security challenge of our day and we want
3	to try to make a contribution to that dialogue with
4	our observations and our recommendations. We have
5	no illusion at all as to the difficulty of the
6	past, but we know that the country needs help now
7	in working through this and we will add whatever we
8	can by way of a constructive contribution.
9	We will not be visiting past debates
10	about Iraq. We will leave that to the historians.
11	We obviously have to understand where we are at
12	this point, but our whole effort will be to look
13	forward and to try to answer the question of what's
14	next in Iraq. We will do our very best to get a
15	bipartisan agreement. We don't have any illusions
16	about that either. We know that's going to be very
17	tough to do, but we recognize that we have a group
18	of members of goodwill who put the national
19	interest above all else and they and Jim and I will
20	do our very best to try to come together on this
21	hugely important issue for the country.
22	I want to make it quite clear to the
23	members of Congress here that we will consult with
24	them carefully. Several of them have been to Iraq
25	not a few times but many times and almost all of
26	them I think have been to Iraq once or twice

1	There's a lot of expertise standing around me here
2	now in the members of the Congress, the Senate and
3	the House, about Iraq and we want to make sure that
4	we draw on that experience and the wisdom. We are
5	as open as I think you can be to diverse views
6	about what to do there and different ideas of how
7	to move forward.
8	We will organize our work in the
9	following manner. Jim and I will co-chair the
10	study group made up of the ten members. Our work
11	will be supported by a senior panel of military
12	advisors, retired four star generals and for the
13	most part, I think, one retired two star general.
14	In addition to the military advisory
15	group, we will have four working groups made up of
16	experts, eight to ten experts in each group. We
17	will not be announcing those names today. I think
18	all have been contacted. We have not heard back
19	from all of them at this point.
20	These expert working groups will
21	support our work on four topics: first, the
22	strategic environment in Iraq and the region;
23	second, the military and security situation in
24	Iraq; third, the political development in Iraq; and
25	fourth, the economic reconstruction of Iraq.
26	Details of a trip to Iraq are now being worked out.

1	Let me conclude by saying that each of
2	us today is here because we recognize the
3	importance of Iraq to the United States. We should
4	say that we honor the sacrifice of the Americans
5	who have served in Iraq and continue to serve very
6	bravely today. We enter this exercise with open
7	minds and a firm commitment to help this country
8	deal with one of its most difficult challenges.
9	Thank you.
10	SECRETARY BAKER: We would ponder a few
11	questions if the press has any or duck them as the
12	case may be. Yes.
13	PRESS: To what extent do you plan
14	to engage the Administration in your work? Have
15	you heard from them about this group and having
16	support of it?
17	SECRETARY BAKER: The Administration as
18	we understand it will welcome the effort. That's a
19	question of course you would better direct
20	downtown, but I suggest you do so. We have been
21	told that the Administration will cooperate with
22	our effort in terms of travel. It's not easy to go
23	to Iraq unless you go military air. They will
24	cooperate with our effort in terms of access to
25	people and to documents. Yes sir.

REPRESENTATIVE HAMILTON:

Jim, may I

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1	say that Senator Lieberman has joined us. We're
2	are delighted to have him.
3	SECRETARY BAKER: Welcome.
4	REPRESENTATIVE HAMILTON: And John
5	Hamre from the CSIS is here as well.
6	SECRETARY BAKER: Welcome Senator and
7	John. Yes sir.
8	PRESS: Excuse me if you have this in
9	the documents, but do you have a sense of the time
10	frame for accomplishing this
11	SECRETARY BAKER: There is no time
12	frame stated in the documents and we have not set
13	a time frame. Our view is that we're going to do
14	this as expeditiously as we can considering the
15	fact that we want to be correct, we want to be
16	efficient and we want to be accurate. But we're
17	not going to set a time frame on it. We may come
18	forward with some interim reports if we think it
19	necessary.
20	PRESS: Chairman Hamilton, based on
21	your experience with the 9/11 Commission, what sort
22	of weight do you expect the Iraq study to and
23	carry with the Administration and the Congress?
24	SECRETARY BAKER: Well, since we have
25	the Chairman and I on the Committee here, I'm going
26	to let Lee Hamilton answer that question for you.

1	REPRESENTATIVE HAMILTON: I don't think
2	any study group has immediately credibility. I
3	think you have to earn it and we'll do our best to
4	earn that. That's for certain. The history of the
5	9/11 Commission, we have very distinguished
6	officials, former officials, on the group. Jim and
7	I have a lot of confidence in them, but neither do
8	we expect that just because we say something
9	everybody's going to immediately fall in line and
10	support it. We'll do our best to give this an
11	objective analysis and make the best
12	recommendations we can and we will be prepared to
13	support and defend those recommendations. But they
14	will have to stand on their own merits and like
15	everything else in this town, they will be
16	scrutinized and criticized and that's all a part of
17	the process.
18	PRESS: May I ask a quick follow-up?
19	With Giuliani on the Commission, is there any
20	question as to whether it might lose some
21	credibility if he considers a presidential bid?
22	(Reply off microphone.)
23	SECRETARY BAKER: I don't think that's
24	going to affect the quality of his service on the
25	Commission.
26	PRESS: Secretary Baker, could you or

1	Mr. Hamilton comment on how dire you think the
2	situation is in Iraq right now and, Secretary
3	Baker, in particular, do you think fresh blood at
4	the White House would help the situation?
5	SECRETARY BAKER: That's not within the
6	purview of our Iraq Study Group, the question of
7	fresh blood in the White House and I didn't
8	understand Congressman Hamilton to say that the
9	danger is extraordinarily dire. One of the first
10	things we are going to have to do and will do is
11	satisfy ourselves with respect to exactly what are
12	the facts and circumstances with respect to Iraq
13	today.
14	PRESS: Secretary Baker, you mentioned
15	that there's a need at this point in time for an
16	honest assessment of the situation in Iraq. What
17	kind of a commentary on the Administration might it
18	be seen to be that such an honest assessment is
19	needed at this point?
20	SECRETARY BAKER: What kind of a
21	commentary on the Administration is it that an
22	assessment of where we go from here? I think the
23	commentary is that you have a pretty broad-engaged
24	Administration who is willing to accept and look
25	for suggestions and advice that might benefit the

1	national security question. Again, I have to refer
2	you downtown. I'm not the person that speaks for
3	the White House. You should ask them what their
4	view is with respect to this mission and this
5	effort.
6	PRESS: Mr. Secretary, Representative
7	Hamilton, so you have no assessment, no feel, right
8	now whether Iraq is in the midst of a civil war?
9	REPRESENTATIVE HAMILTON: No, we do
10	not.
11	PRESS: If you do not think things are
12	not going well there, then why are you forming this
13	group?
14	REPRESENTATIVE HAMILTON: Look. We have
15	made it very clear. I guess this is very obvious
16	to all of us that this is a formidable challenge
17	for the country. Where do you go next? What are
18	the next steps in Iraq? We have not tried to make
19	a judgment at this point as where we are right now.
20	The very first thing probably the group will have
21	to do is to try to understand where we are right
22	now, but Jim and I do not make any judgment about
23	that at the present time and certainly make no
24	judgment about the future.
25	REPRESENTATIVE WOLF: If I could just.
26	The Congress as to this asked a group of us who

1	have been in Iraq a number of times, Republicans
2	and Democrats, came back in a bipartisan basis to
3	ask for the good of the country to take fresh eyes
4	on the target. Also there was \$1.3 million in a
5	supplemental which will pass the House today or
6	tomorrow and Mr. Molloham and I support it in a
7	bipartisan way.
8	So the request for this really came out
9	of members of Congress of both parties who have
10	been to Iraq in the past and feel fresh eyes is a
11	very good approach. And it's not a secret to know
12	that. I think people have been desirous of coming
13	together to find a common ground and quite frankly,
14	I have been so appreciative of the members on both
15	sides, Republicans and Democrats, who have agreed
16	to come forward and do this. But this is really an
17	initiative that has come from the Congress by the
18	members of Congress who have actually been there.
19	PRESS: Excuse me. So when you have to
20	look at a range of alternatives, can you just flesh
21	that out? Is that timetables for withdrawal? What
22	do you mean?
23	SECRETARY BAKER: As Congressman
24	Hamilton indicated to you, we're going to be
25	looking in four broad areas. We're going to be
26	looking in terms of the strategic environment, what

1	the situation is there now and it's possible impact
2	on the environment in the region. We're going to
3	looking at politics and the formation of the
4	government, where does that stand today and what's
5	the best way to move that forward. We're going to
6	be looking at economic and reconstruction issues
7	and we're going to be looking at the military
8	situation. That's the best way I know to answer
9	your question. We're going to take a look in all
10	four of those broad areas.
11	MR. SOLOMON: A number of our Senators
12	and Congressman have a 9:30 a.m. meeting. But we
13	certainly appreciate them all coming here today,
14	Senator Warner, in particular for making this
15	facility available. Thank you all for coming.

17	conference concluded.)
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
