Dear Ambassador Solomon:

I would like to take this opportunity to highlight the valuable contributions the US Institute for Peace (USIP) brings to US national security and in particular National Defense University (NDU). USIP and NDU have a long-standing relationship between two institutions that are at the center of education and inquiry in the areas of international conflict, national security affairs and the establishment of the rule of law to foster human security. Both institutions have a mutual interest in national and international security affairs and share in the responsibility for the preparation of leaders and practitioners. Congress has recognized the importance of this strategic relationship by directing the NDU President sit on the USIP Board of Directors.

More recently, USIP has agreed to provide a critical assessment of our curriculum. They have the knowledge and independence to ensure we are delivering appropriate, relevant content for the leaders and future leaders that attend NDU.

Collaborating on joint conferences, research and gaming projects has and will continue to strengthen our national strategies on rule of law procedures and steady state conditions in many critical areas worldwide. These activities are critical to maintaining a strong US presence which supports our global national security strategy and protects US interests, personnel and properties abroad. Without the fine men and women of USIP who dedicate their efforts in these endeavors, the US risks being poorly prepared to face on-going and future contingencies.
